Intergenerational activities with foreign-born older people





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**Erika Marek** is an associate professor at the Department of Public Health Medicine (Department of Migration Health), Medical School, University of Pécs (UP-MS), Hungary. She has her PhD in public health in the field of health promotion (2013). Her research interest includes: migrant and ethnic minority health, health-sociology, community health, with a special focus on vulnerable populations (migrants and refugees, Romas, etc.); their health knowledge and health behaviour, as well as their access to health care services; health promotion and health education (ie. for asylum seekers); medical education: improving migration-health awareness and intercultural competence of the medical students.

#### **SUMMARY**

The Roma or Gipsy population is the largest ethnic minority in Europe with an estimated 10-12 million people. It is commonly noted that the demographic characteristics of the Roma people significantly differ from those of the majority populations, and their natural demographic indicators (high fertility and mortality rates, low life expectancy at birth, etc.) are similar to populations in the stage of demographic transition. Recents studies indicate that morbidity rates among the Romas are also significantly worse throughout Europe, suggesting that they are more commonly and more seriously ill during their shorter lives. This presentation aims to highlight some underlying factors behind these unfavourable demographic and health indicators, as well as introduces the legal, institutional and cultural context of Roma elderly care in Hungary. Intergenerational aspects, such as the views and attitudes of adult Roma descendants towards elderly care will also be discussed, based on some current interview and questionnaire surveys.
